A Message from our President & CEO

The last 12 months have presented countless challenges for our hospital. Endlessly-evolving COVID-19 regulations, nationwide staffing and supply chain issues, and an extreme uptick in healthcare worker burnout have all been uniquely challenging to overcome. For Eaton Rapids Medical Center (ERMC), 2021 has been a year of practicing flexibility while continuing to meet the highest standards of care and safety.

What stands out to me most about this year is a profound sense of gratitude for our staff. We are fortunate to have an amazing group of people, both on the frontlines and behind the scenes, who have remained committed to keeping our facility open and operating safely during such tumultuous times. The staff at ERMC are truly infallible, they remain undaunted by the obstacles that continue to crop up as the months wear on. Every member of this team contributes to providing exceptional care for our community, as well as for one another. It never ceases to amaze me.

Over the course of the year I have observed many acts of support, care, and resilience quietly undertaken by our staff. I would like to share two examples of those efforts, but there are many more I don't have room to recognize here.

Medical Assistants, LeighAnn Sharp and Claire Quainton willingly endured freezing temperatures and gusting winds all season long as they swabbed patients for flu, strep throat and COVID-19 at our facility's outdoor testing site. They never complained, and their efforts made an important impact on our community. Surgery department manager Linda Reid recently came in for work at 5:00a.m. to prepare patients for surgery, treated and cared for patients all day long, and then voluntarily stayed to administer flu shots until 7:00p.m. that evening. That kind of unwavering commitment is nothing short of astounding. It's meaningful actions like these which inspired us to designate every ERMC staff member as 2020's official Employees of the Year. We hope this served as a small gesture of our gratitude and appreciation.

Though we are extremely grateful for our employees, we faced unprecedented staffing issues in 2021. Not only is there a critical shortage of nurses and physicians, but also medical assistants, laboratory technicians, respiratory therapists, and so many more. Virtually every area of our hospital has been affected by this. Many departments have been running on bare-bones teams for

months, and staff are working long hours to take care of the overwhelming backlog of patients created during the pandemic shutdowns.

We are not alone in this struggle. In fact, the Michigan Health and Hospital Association (MHA) has identified staffing woes as the number one issue healthcare providers are facing across the state. We are also experiencing a spike in COVID-related employee illnesses. The result of which is staff being forced to wait at home as their test results process for days, all the while knowing they are desperately needed in their departments. This has pushed us close to a crisis point several times, but our leaders and staff continue to find a way to carry on.

We will continue to overcome these challenges as we have all the others we've navigated: through an abundance of strength and commitment. With the support of our community behind us, our staff's dedication carrying us through each day, and an unwavering resolve in one another, we will move forward, together.

Normally, if you work on the financial side of healthcare, the announcement of a new disease does not necessarily suggest a significant change in the day. But in the nearly 13 years that I have worked for Eaton Rapids Medical Center, we have never been more challenged.

Each month we ask the same questions. The first one being, "what do our patient volumes look like?" I check almost every day. The lower levels we had experienced in 2020 continued through most of 2021. This is not surprising given the pandemic has refused to go away; however, we are encouraged by the increases we have seen over the last several months. There are other questions that require daily updates such as:

- What staffing levels are needed?
- What is the cost to bring in additional staff?
- How much have the cost of supplies increased?
- Do we need to stockpile additional supplies as we anticipate upcoming surges?

The answers to these questions help us identify needs and plan for expenses to focus on delivering the best patient experience.

I shared last year that the Federal Government helped healthcare entities by approving the CARES Act Provider Relief Funds and mentioned that the program requirements were revised many times. Those changes continued through most of 2021. The good news is that the final requirements have been established. We are now in the process of validating our compliance with the hopes of retaining the funds received.

In addition, the Federal Government approved the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) which was designed to keep our staff employed. We recently received notification that our first loan has been forgiven and we

are able to keep those funds. We took out a second PPP loan early in 2021 and will be submitting for its forgiveness soon. In September, the Biden Administration also made \$25.5 billion available to healthcare providers affected by the pandemic. The funding will be distributed based on entities' lost revenue and expenses, with a higher percentage going to smaller providers serving Medicaid and Medicare patients. We are waiting to hear whether we qualify for any of this funding.

Although these programs made a significant difference in our ability to weather the impact of the pandemic, our continued operations are due to the dedication of our staff. They have stepped up in so many ways. From our front line patient access (registration) team, to our nurses, to housekeepers, and so many more all working extra shifts when needed; medical staff helping with registration, business staff helping with vaccinations, they remain positive in what can be a challenging environment for all. Because of our team, we continue to provide excellent care. We join many in the hopes that the pandemic will be over soon. In the meantime, please be safe and know that we are here to support you and your healthcare needs.

Perseverance, strength, and devotion are just a few of the terms that spring to mind when I reflect on the actions of Eaton Rapids Medical Center (ERMC) staff and providers over the course of the last year. Our employees have worked tirelessly to provide excellent care to every patient who enters our facility and we could not be prouder to have such amazing individuals on our team.

Just as you have all been living through unprecedented events and challenging times, so has ERMC. We rise to the occasion each day guided by a thorough emergency preparedness plan and supported by our incredible staff. ERMC's Incident Command team continues to meet weekly to discuss safety requirements such as mask and visitor policies, analyze data from the CDC and local health departments, and focus on making informed decisions that will keep our staff and patients safe. We remain committed to providing exemplary care to our community, and that commitment requires creativity and tenacity as we approach each new challenge.

Despite another year of considerable upheaval, we have continued to prioritize growth and forward motion for our hospital. Highlighted below are some advancements and updates we made over the last 12 months in order to remain at the forefront of healthcare.

- Emergency department staff demonstrated their extensive ability, knowledge, and expertise in trauma care to the State of Michigan and earned ERMC's Level IV trauma center reverification through October 2025. In fact this program has been so successful that we were chosen as the State's pilot hospital to test a virtual reverification program. Great work by emergency department staff, as well as Brad Simons, Emergency and Trauma Program Manager, and Dr. Fata, Emergency Medical and Trauma Program Director.
- The medical surgical unit and emergency department received upgrades to their telemetry patientmonitoring equipment. This state-of-the-art equipment allows nursing staff to access patients' real-time vital information, provides the opportunity to monitor patients in more areas of the hospital, and aids in inpatient healing as those patients benefit from having a lighter device to monitor their heart rhythm.

- Respiratory therapists this year received several new pieces of equipment to aid in the care of COVID-19 patients. These technologically advanced machines provide the best, most evidence-based care to patients needing respiratory support.
- Our radiology department upgraded their portable x-ray machine to a new model that makes it easier to take x-rays of patients in their exam room, and delivers real-time images to providers. Adjustments and a plan of care can be quickly tailored based on these results, right at the bedside. We also undertook a major renovation project to upgrade the radiology room with a cutting-edge system that uses camera-assisted patient monitoring during the imaging process to prevent potential falls. This top-of-the-line system provides a much higher quality image at a considerably lower radiation dose than previous equipment.
- Our emergency department team partnered with the Riding for Ryan bicycle flag program which promotes the safety of young bike riders by encouraging visibility and awareness. The bright yellow flags attach to the child's bike and allow them to be more visible to motor vehicles. Our emergency department provides them to children as part of our injuryprevention program. - We also wish to acknowledge the retirement of Dr. Lilleboe, Emergency Department physician, after many years of dedicated service to the community. We wish her the best!

The past year presented many challenges for healthcare professionals. We faced rapidly changing guidelines, COVID-19 patient surges, and climbing case numbers in our area. However, in the midst of those struggles, there have been many accomplishments to celebrate here at Eaton Rapids Medical Center (ERMC).

Our specialty clinic welcomed Amy Hollern as their new manager. She comes to us with many years of leadership experience and will focus on adding and expanding specialty services needed in our community. We expanded cardiology services from three days a week to five days a week. Our dedicated cardiology center offers echocardiograms, stress testing, carotid doppler, venous doppler, arterial doppler, Holter monitoring, pacemaker management, and cardioversion procedures. Partnering with McLaren Greater Lansing, our expert team of heart specialists, Mohan Madala, MD, Ibrahim Shah, MD, Kathie England, CNP, Elizabeth McComb, PA-C, Jessie McWaters, PA-C, Emily Van Hoogstraat, NP-C are committed to providing our patients with comprehensive and compassionate cardiac care, close to home.

Our infusion center recently began monoclonal antibody therapy as a treatment for COVID-19. With monoclonal antibody therapy, physicians now have a way to help prevent severe symptoms from developing in those who are at higher risk. The goal of this therapy is to help prevent hospitalizations, reduce viral loads, and lessen symptom severity.

This type of therapy relies on monoclonal antibodies, or antibodies that are similar to the ones your body would naturally make in response to infection. However,

monoclonal antibodies are mass-produced in a laboratory and are designed to recognize a specific component of this virus — the spike protein on its outer shell. By targeting the spike protein, they give the immune system a leg up until it can mount its own response. Your doctor can help determine if monoclonal antibody treatment is right for you.

We have made enhancements in the laboratory department this year, including the recent hiring of a new laboratory manager, Carrie Ternes. Carrie and her team have worked extremely hard adding four new laboratory analyzers to ensure the community has the most state-of-the-art equipment to improve quality, aid in diagnosing disease, and help maintain wellness. Our surgical team continues to provide excellent care using the latest technology. We have added new urology procedures that help with urinary incontinence and enlarged prostate, CT-guided total joint replacement, and neurosurgery procedures to treat chronic back pain. Our anesthesia team offers narcotic-free total joint replacement by providing regional blocks pre-operatively. This method helps patients recover more comfortably with fewer side effects.

We also have new additions to our Rural Health Clinics. We welcomed Tanya Marsh as our manager of Rural Health Clinics. We are also excited to add new providers Travis Brown PA, Heidi Pusey NP, and Lindsey Ford NP to service our Eaton Rapids and Springport communities. Lindsey and Heidi will begin seeing patients in December. In addition to our Family Practice and RediCare services, our Population Health Team offers chronic care management (CCM). This team's approach to wellness works with our elderly patients and those having two or more chronic disease, such as diabetes, hypertension, and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease to optimize their health, increase their quality of life, and prevent hospitalization.

Despite a difficult year in healthcare, Eaton Rapids Medical Center remains the hospital of choice for the residents of Eaton Rapids and the surrounding area. We are so thankful for the support of our community. We feel your love, prayers, and well wishes. They keep us going when we are exhausted, short-staffed, brokenhearted, and discouraged. LeighAnn Sharp and Claire Quainton, Certified Medical Assistants (CMAs), spent every weekday since mid-November 2020 to the end of May in the parking lot of Eaton Rapids Medical Center (ERMC) swabbing patients for COVID-19. Each morning they donned full sets of personal protective equipment -including N95 masks, disposable plastic gowns, face shields, and sterile gloves- and stepped outside into the temperamental Michigan weather to begin collecting nasal swabs from a line of patients waiting in their running vehicles. Sharp and Quainton did this for eight hours, Monday through Friday, in gusting winds, freezing rain, and blowing snow. They did it without complaint, and if you were to praise them for their commitment, they would likely shrug their shoulders and tell you it isn't such a big deal.

However, to many residents of the Eaton Rapids community, the testing Sharp and Quainton provided was crucial. Eaton Rapids Medical Center is a rural, critical access hospital providing care to patients who may otherwise be unable to receive treatment due to their inability to travel long distances, and that principle applies to COVID-19 testing as well.

"This was truly a critical need for our community," said Tim Johnson, President and CEO of ERMC. "We continued to see long lines of folks showing up to be tested in our parking lot. Claire and Leighann did a phenomenal job of keeping up with that need and making sure each patient was properly cared for despite the harsh conditions of working outdoors."

Though Sharp and Quainton are both humble about their contributions during the pandemic, they will reluctantly admit the weather did get to them, and it can be the best or worst part of a long shift.

"It's not so much the cold that gets you, it's the wind", Sharp said, flexing her cold hands. "The wind is the thing that makes your fingers go numb after a while—and not feeling your fingers is a tough thing to deal with in this job."

However, on those rare sunny, Michigan spring days both CMAs appreciated the reprieve.

"On the warmer days, when the sun is out, quite a few more people come in for tests," Quainton remarked. "But it makes time go by much quicker when the weather is beautiful!"

On the day I interviewed them in the small trailer used as a makeshift office, situated next to a sturdy metal car port where patients pull in, the wind was whipping so hard it slammed the door closed suddenly. As I jumped, both Sharp and Quainton laughed a little. "You get used to it, eventually," they explained.

They were also happy to share a few memorable moments from their time staffing the testing area. They have truly seen it all: patients asking if their dog could be swabbed, a car breaking down right in the middle of a busy rush which resulted in the pair helping the driver push the vehicle out of the way, and even a full-size semi-truck pulling in for testing.

But mostly, they both think about the immense amount of community support they've received. Local businesses surprised them with hot cocoa on cold winter days, grateful individuals shared homemade baked goods with them to keep their spirits up, and the entire community vocalized a resounding thank you, over and over again.

ERMC announces Employees of the Year



All Eaton Rapids Medical Center (ERMC) employees were honored with this year's Dr. Meinke & Dr. Sherman Award. Traditionally, two ERMC employees are recognized for providing exceptional service to fellow staff members, patients, and the community. Every time I see a medical assistant, health care assistant, or nurse holding the hand of a patient or visitor, I know there is kindness in their hearts. Every time I see someone eating a tasty meal from culinary services, I know that it was made to comfort those having a rough day. Every time I see a leader stepping in to help their team, I know there is empathy for the hard work that is being done. Every time I received a thank you card or token of appreciation, I knew that someone was thinking of me and how I might be struggling. Every time I broke down in frustration or fear, I knew that someone was there for me to lean on. Every time I think of what this year has brought to our ERMC family, I know that we stand strong together."

The past year has not been easy, we have faced a lot of changes and challenges. But Sue has gotten us through all of it."
